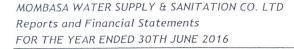

### REPORT OF THE MANAGING DIRECTOR

#### RESULTS

In the year ending 30th June 2016 the company continued making losses after posting a loss of KES 402 Million. This was mainly due to reduction in the water volumes supplied by CWSB and provisions for contingent liability that the company is exposed to.

#### COMPANY'S STRATEGIC DIRECTION

The company is reviewing its 5-year strategic plan of 2017 that continues to guide its turnaround in performance for the next 2 years. The Board of Directors have competitively filled the position of the MD (effective Feb-16) and senior Management team to guide the company in turnaround process.

#### THE CHALLENGE

Continued reduction in water volumes supplied and increase in non revenue water remained the biggest challenges during this period of the strategic plan. This was due to political temperatures (following devolution of water provision service to counties as enshrined in the Constitution of Kenya, 2010) around water supply to Mombasa from the neighbouring counties where water sources are and the aging water infrastructure.

#### THE FUTURE

Although we are in a negative position, I am glad to report that the future is bright. We have so far received development aid through the World Bank and technical support from our development partner, VEI aimed at improving the financial position of the company. We have initiated several water supply improvement projects. The Board of Directors and Management, together with World Bank Consultants are engaged in Management Turnaround Programe that will see the company plug its budget deficit, attain self-sustainability following technological and infrastructural development, construction of additional water sources and fight against NRW. These will improve water flows to the County and substantially reduce the water problems experienced, consequently improving the revenues of the utility.

### APPRECIATION

We do not take for granted the support of our customers who have continued to support our operation through timely payment of their bills. To the Management and employees who stand with the company and offer their labour tirelessly, my recognition of your effots is unconditionally honoured. May we not lose focus as we remain committed to changing the fortunes of Mombasa Water.

# REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Mombasa Water Supply and Sanitation Company Limited set out on pages 10 to 21, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2016, and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. I have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

## Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

The management is also responsible for the submission of the financial statements to the Auditor-General in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

## Auditor-General's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on the audit and report in accordance with the provisions of Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and submit the audit report in compliance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution. The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). Those standards require compliance with ethical requirements and that the audit be planned and performed to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

Report of the Auditor-General on the Financial Statements of Mombasa Water Supply and Sanitation Company Limited for the year ended 30 June 2016

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amount and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's prepara and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit proceduthat are appropriate in the circumstances but not for the purpose of expressing opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control. An audit also inclue evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overpresentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide basis for my qualified audit opinion.

# **Basis for Qualified Opinion**

## 1. Share Capital

As reported in the year 2014/2015, Mombasa Water Supply and Sanitation Compa Limited was incorporated on 18 March 2011 to take over services of the defur Mombasa Water & Sewerage Company Limited which had an authorised share cap of Kshs.5,000,000. However the old Company was not liquidated and no shares have been transferred to the new Company as at 30 June 2016.

Further, out of the new Company's authorised share capital of 5,000 shares Kshs.1,000 each, only 12 shares valued at Kshs.12,000 were allotted but not paid leaving a balance of 4,988 shares un-allotted. However, financial statements reflexissued but not paid share capital of Kshs.5,000,240 in respect of ordinary shares par value of Kshs.1,000 each and 12 of par value of Kshs.20 each, which is more that the authorised share capital of Kshs.5,000,000. Further, the issued but not paid share capital of Kshs.5,000,240 is also reflected in the receivables as unpaid share capital

In the circumstance, the accuracy and authenticity of the share capital balance Kshs.5,000,240 as at 30 June 2016 cannot be confirmed.

# 2. Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables as detailed in Note 10 to the financial statements reflect payroll deductions totaling Kshs.Kshs.122,848,908, out of which a sum (Kshs.78,005,723 is in respect of unremitted and overdue statutory deductions which are likely to attract interest charges and penalties. Further, disclosed in Note 10 is trade payables' balance of Kshs.917,879,398, out of which a sum (Kshs.834,591,258 is owed the Coast Water Services Board. However, recommaintained by the Board indicate a debt balance of Kshs.1,156,446,496, thus resulting

to a variance of Kshs.321,855,238 and which has neither been explained nor reconciled.

Consequently, the accuracy and completeness of the trade and other payables balance of Kshs.1,295,373,556 as at 30 June 2016 cannot be confirmed.

### 3. Audit Fees

Note 10 to the financial statements reflect provision for audit fees balance of Kshs.2,384,043 out of which Kshs.1,524,043 has been outstanding for more than one year. No plausible explanation has been provided for the non-payment of the fees.

### **Qualified Opinion**

In my opinion, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Mombasa Water Supply and Sanitation Company Limited as at 30 June 2016 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards and comply with the Water Act, 2012 and Companies Act Cap 486 of the Laws of Kenya.

### REPORT ON OTHER LEGAL AND REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

As required by the Companies Act, I report based on my audit, that:

- i. I have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit;
- ii. In my opinion, adequate accounting records have been kept by the Company so far as appears from the examination of those records; and
- the Company's financial statements are in agreement with the accounting records.

#### Other Matter

### 1.0 Budgetary Control and Performance

The following observations were made regarding the Company's budgetary control and performance for the year ended 30 June 2016:

### 1.1 Revenue Budget

During the year under review, the Company's revenue budget amounted to Kshs.1,369,004,697 against actual collections of Kshs.825,307,632 (60%) thus resulting to a shortfall of Kshs.543,697,065 or 40% of the budget as detailed below:

The under collection may be as a result of over budgeting or non-collection of revenue due to the Company, a situation that may have negatively impacted on its cash flow and operations.

# 1.2 Under-expenditure

During the year under review, the Company's expenditure budget totals Kshs.1,202,189,375 and it spent Kshs.865,412,542 or 72% of the budget the resulting to under-expenditure of Kshs.336,776,833 or 28%.

The under-expenditure indicates that the Company could not implement all the activities in its budget for the year under review.

### 2.0 Unaccounted for Water

As was the case in the previous years, the statement of comprehensive income for the year ended 30 June 2016 reflects water sales valued at Kshs.669,452,685. Record presented for audit review indicated that during the year under review, the Compan produced 14,819,170 cubic meters of water, out of which only 7,474,855 cubic meters or approximately 50.4% was billed to customers. The balance of 7,344,315 cubic meters or approximately 49.6% of the total volume represented unaccounted for water (UFW), which is far above the maximum allowable loss of 25% recommended by Water Services Regulatory Board guidelines. The UFW of 49.6% may have resulted to loss of water sales estimated at Kshs.657,756,851 since the cost of each cubic meters of water is estimated at Kshs.89.56.

Unaccounted for water constraints the Company's profitability and operational sustainability.

### 3.0 Going Concern

During the year under review, the Company incurred a loss of Kshs.402,415,750 (2015: Loss-Kshs.467,245,473) which brought its accumulated loss to Kshs.1,502,988,136 (2015: Accumulated loss-Kshs.1,100,572,386) as at 30 June 2016. Further, its current liabilities of Kshs.1,318,526,521 exceed current assets of

Kshs.266,737,500 by Kshs.1,051,789,021. In spite of it's current liabilities exceeding it's current assets, the Company's financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis which assumes continued financial support from the Government, development partners and creditors.

# 4.0 Human Resource Management

### 4.1 Recruitment of Staff

Human resource records presented for audit review indicated that during the year under review, the Company recruited twenty two (22) staff members which includes nine (9) for an ongoing Project. However, no evidence was presented a for audit review to confirm that the positions were filled competitively in line with Section 1.1.1 of the Company's Human Resource Policy, 2012 which requires all vacant positions be advertised internally and externally in order to attract the most suitable candidates.

Consequently, the recruitment of the twenty (22) employees is contrary to the Law and is therefore irregular.

# 4.2 Employees Serving on Expired Contracts

The Company's human resource records presented for audit review indicated that the Company had in its payroll five (5) employees whose contracts of employment had expired without requests for renewal or approval of new contracts, contrary to Section 3.8.2 of the Company's Human Resource Policy, 2012 which provides that 'employees serving on contract terms of service who wish to have their contracts renewed shall tender to the Managing Director written requests not more than six (6) months and not less than three (3) months before the expiry of their respective contracts'. Further, the Office of the President Circular No. OP/CAB.2/7A of 14 February 2014 requires all officers aged fifty-eight (58) years and above to have duly identified successors to enable smooth exit from the service when they attain the mandatory retirement age of sixty (60) years.

The continued retention of the employees in the payroll is therefore irregular.

My opinion is not qualified in respect of these matters.

#### Summary of significant Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below:

### a) Statement of compliance and basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis for property, plant and equipment, financial instruments at fair value and liabilities at their fair value. The preparation of financial statements in conformity to International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) allows use of estimates and assumptions. It requires management to exercise judgement in the process of reporting applying the entity's accounting policies. The financial statements have been prepared and presentedin Kenya Shillings, which is the functional and reporting currency of this entity and all values are rounded to the nearest shilling. In addition, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with PFM Act, 2012, The Companies Act, and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS). The accounting policies adopted have been consistently applied to all the years presented.

# Adoption of new and revised International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and interpretations

In 2007 new and revised standards and interpretations became effective for the first time and have been adopted by the Company where relevant to its operations. This only resulted in changes in presentation and disclosures as follows:

Sales are the aggregate invoiced value of the residential rental services rendered

#### IFRS 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosures

This standard requires disclosures that enable users of the Financial Statements to evaluate the significance of the Company's financial instruments and the nature and extent of risks arising from those financial instruments. The new disclosures are included throughout the Financial Statements. While there has been no effect on the financial position or results, comparative information has been revised where needed.

### IAS 1 Presentation of Financial Statements

This amendment requires the Company to make new disclosures to enable users of the Financial Statements to evaluate the Company's objectives, policies and processes for managing capital. These new disclosures are shown in note 1 (a)

The following amendment to an existing standard will be mandatory for the Company's accounting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2008, but which the Company has not early adopted:

IFRIC 11 - Group and Treasury Share Transactions - from 01 January 2008

IFRIC 12 - Service Concession Arrangements - from 01 January 2008

IFRS 8 - Operating Segments - from 01 January 2009

IAS 23 - Borrowing costs (revised) - from 01 January 2009

#### b Revenue Recognition

Sale of goods are recognised in the period in which the Company delivers products to the customer, the customer has accepted the products and the collectability of the related receivables are reasonably assured.

Sale of services are recognised in the period in which the services are rendered, by reference to completion of the specific transaction asses on the basis of the actual service provided as apportion of the total services provided.

Revenue represents the fair value of the consideration received or receivable for the sales of goods and services and is stated net of adjustments.

#### c Trade Receivables

Receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate. A provision for impairment is recognised in the profit and loss account in the year when the recovery of the amount due as per the original terms is doubtful. The provision is based on the difference between the carrying amount and the present value of the expected cash flows, discounted at effective interest rate. Receivables not collectable are written off against the related provision. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited to the profit and loss account in the year of recovery.

## Summary of significant Accounting Policies(Cont'd)

### d) Provision for liabilities and charges

Provisions are recognised when the company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation can be made.

### g) Retirement benefit obligations

The company and the employees contribute to the National Social Security Fund, a national defined contribution scheme. Contributions are determined by local statute and the partnership's contributions are charged to the profit and loss account in the year to which they relate.

### h) Taxation

Current tax is provided on the basis of the results for the year in accordance with the fiscal laws of Kenya.

### i) Financial Liabilities

All financial liabilities including borrowings are recognised initially at fair value.

### j) Cash and cash equivalent

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, short term and call deposits with banking institutions and other short term highly liquid investments in money market instruments with maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition net of bank overdrafts.

## h) Property, Plant and Equipment & Depreciation

All categories of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation on PPE is recognised in the income statement on a reducing balance and on prorata basis in the year of acquisition. The annual rates in use are:

### 25 Contingent Liability

We have (provided) in the accounts additional general provisions of Kshs. 135M with allocation of Kshs. 100M to actuarial deficit to Pension Schemes, 5M to legal costs and 30M to penalties and fines resulting from possible liability on unremitted staff deductions, unresolved tax issues with KRA particularly VAT on sewer and outstanding sundry creditors. The company's estimated pension exposure is about Kshs. 160M. we have however provided for Kshs. 100M as we conclude negotiation of waiver of penalties and/or (part) of deficit for prior periods.

### 26 Business Segments

The major part the Company falls under the category of provision of quality and sufficient water and sewerege services.

### 27 Country of Incorporation
